

CROWD Bookmarks

Dialogic reading, or interactive reading, occurs when an adult and a child engage in conversation around a text they are reading together. This might include defining unfamiliar words, discussing story elements, and more. Dialogic reading helps early readers develop print awareness, oral language, comprehension, and other vital literacy skills. These bookmarks remind caregivers to ask questions of a variety of types while reading with their children.

COMPLETION Ask your child to complete a sentence or phrase from a book you are reading.

RECALL Ask your child details about what happened in the story.

OPEN-ENDED Ask your child to tell you what is happening in a picture in the book.

WH-PROMPTS Ask questions about the story that begin "what," "who," "where," "when," or "why."

DISTANCING Ask questions that relate something in the story to your child's life.
