

Important Elements of Literary Texts

This anchor chart defines eight important features of literary texts: characters, plot, setting, theme, central idea, point of view, structure, and word choice. This chart could be used to supplement explicit instruction in developing higher-order questions related to literary texts. 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M	Characters	Motivations, thoughts, feelings, reactions
	Plot	Exposition, rising action, climax, falling action, resolution, conflict, tension, suspense
	Setting	"When, where, weather;" effect on mood or plot
15:	Theme	The author's message to the reader; how the author develops the message
- <u>Ö</u> -	Central Idea	A main idea in the text; how the author develops the main idea
(Point of View	The type of narration used and how it affects the reader's understanding; how the author develops the point of view
X	Structure	Contribution of a sentence, chapter, scene, or stanza to a theme or central idea
	Word Choice	Figurative language; sensory details, connotative meanings; impact on meaning and tone of the text
